2009 marks the 50th anniversary of identifying the genetic cause of Down syndrome, the most frequent chromosomal disorder in the United States accounting for 1 in 733 live births. More than 400,000 people in the US



and millions worldwide have the condition. Despite these numbers, it is the least funded genetic condition by the National Institutes of Health. In 2008, Down syndrome accounted for just 0.0006 of its \$28 billion budget.

The Linda Crnic Institute for Down Syndrome aims to eradicate the ill effects associated with the condition and significantly improve the lives of people with Down syndrome throughout the world. The institute is named in memory of Dr. Linda Crnic and her unwavering dedication to people with Down syndrome through translational research. Crnic, who died tragically in a bicycle accident in 2004, was a professor of pediatrics and psychiatry and director of the Colorado Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities Center.

The inspiration for the establishment of the Linda Crnic Institute is Anna and John J. Sie granddaughter Sophia Kay Whitten, who has Down syndrome. Through the largest private contribution dedicated to people with Down syndrome in the world, the Anna and John J. Sie Foundation's commitment of \$22 million, and the Sie's commitment to raise another \$12 million ensures the institute will be a global beacon for research and care.

The Linda Crnic Institute for Down Syndrome is the first national organization to house basic research, clinical research and clinical care for people with Down syndrome under one umbrella. The institute is a collaboration between the University of Colorado Boulder, the University of Colorado Denver and The Children's Hospital. It is located on the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora, and is the beneficiary of the proceeds from this year's Be Beautiful Be Yourself Jet Set Fashion Show.
